STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

The Lesbian Herstory Archives exists to gather and preserve records of Lesbian lives and activities so that future generations of Lesbians will have ready access to materials relevant to their lives. The process of gathering this material will also serve to uncover and collect our herstory denied to us previously by patriarchal historians in the interests of the culture which they serve. The existence of these Archives will enable us to analyze and reevaluate the Lesbian experience.

We anticipate that the existence of these Archives will encourage Lesbians to record their experiences in order to formulate our living Herstory.

We will collect and preserve ANY materials that are relevant to the lives and experiences of Lesbians: books, magazines, journals, news clippings (from establishment, feminist and Lesbian media), photos, bibliographies, herstorical information, tapes, films, diaries, oral herstories, poetry and prose, biographies, autobiographies, notices of events, posters, graphics, and other memorabilia and obscure references to our lives.

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We need women to tell us if they should be a part of the Archives. Help us end silences if not for now at least for the future. The Lesbian Herstory Archives was created in 1975 to preserve our past, to recognize the need of all Lesbians for a voice in the present and to ensure generational connection in the future. In order to do this we need all Lesbians to contribute a part of themselves to the Archives...make a tape-take a picture- send a messagedraw a symbol-send a letter, a day from a diary or a journal...Since the destruction of Sappho's poetry, our herstory has issued us a warning that we are among the disinherited. Our legacy will be realized only through the efforts of every Lesbian. There are many women who express surprise when we make a plea for tapes, writings, pictures or other materials that they may wish to share with us. "Wo me? Who's interested in my life?" It is our responsibility to validate the Lesbian experience for each other because it is through our collective rejoicing, reclaiming and renewing that our survival as a Lesbian community will be determined.



(Please write us if you have other ideas for cataloguing or if you disagree with this procedure.) The list includes published books, anthologies including Lesbian poets and poems sent to the Archives. If you are a Lesbian poet or know of one who has not been included please let us know and send us a copy of your work. We especially would like to receive unpublished work, poems that have been hidden away, poems written on scraps of paper, poems "not considered good enough". We would also like tapes of poems being read, poems in Spanish, French-all languages. While the material in the Archives is available to all Lesbian women we will respect confidentiality if so desired. Again we ask Lesbian authors to send us copies of their work. Our funds are limited but our goal is not-to preserve Lesbian voices and to end the generational silence. We have not included here the poems published in journals, newsletters, newspapers though we are indexing them. In a later issue of the Archives newsletter we will list our journals so authors can be sure we have a copy of all published work.
